Garrett had a special bond with his mom, Julia. He would call and FaceTime his mom at all hours of the day and night, especially during the holidays when he was away on duty. Garrett's favorite holiday movie was Die Hard and on Christmas Eve he and his mom would watch it while on the phone together.

During a period of leave from the Army, Garrett passed away unexpectedly. While his family was devastated, they were able to take comfort in knowing that Garrett was able to donate his corneas to others in need.

When Julia told Garrett's younger brother that Garrett was able to restore sight to two people, he asked if Garrett could see too. I told him that somehow, through his brothers eye donation, that is how it feels, and helps

others to continue to live and be happy.

Garrett has always wanted happiness for those around him, making a point to bring light and positivity to any situation. During his time in the Army, sharing his love of rap earned him the title of "Eminem of the Army." When Garrett became an eye donor, he changed the lives of two people forever. Contacting Your Donor's Family

A Writing Guide for Transplant Recipients:

- Talk about yourself and how the transplant procedure has impacted you.
- Please do not include personal information such as your address, phone number, surgery facility, or physician.
- · Please sign using only your first name.
- Enclose a separate sheet of paper with your full name, date of your transplant, and the hospital or surgery center where you received your transplant. This information will not be shared with your donor's family.

Tamara Conkle is a sixth-generation horse trainer who works on her family farm in Dade City, Florida. On her birthday, her right eye started burning. She took her contacts out and put on her glasses, thinking her eyes needed a rest. Unfortunately, two days later she could not see anything out of that eye.

Tamara's father had lost his eye from a work-related injury, so she knew she had to see someone as soon as possible. Upon seeing Dr. Ahad Mahootchi, Ophthalmologist in Zephyrhills, Florida, he determined Tamara had a fungal infection and prescribed eye drops which cleared the infection, but unfortunately, her cornea was already damaged. Cornea transplant surgery was her only option to restore her sight.

Tamara feels like she was given a second chance, and grateful to enjoy doing things she loves, being

outside and taking care of her horses.
